Wild Bunch International acquires foreign distribution rights to *Bratan*, Bakhtyar Khudojnazarov's debut film restored by Veit Helmer, to be presented in Venice Classics on Sept 2nd.

Bakhtyar Khudojnazarov made his extraordinary debut, *BRATAN* (aka Brothers) when he was only 25. It already bore the hallmarks of truly great cinema – a poetic mastery of space and landscape, character and story, and luminous black and white cinematography.

Brothers Farukh (17) and Little Fatsy (7) live in a small Tajik town. Raised by their grandmother since their parents separated, they decide to find their father who works as a sanatorium doctor in a distant city. Thus begins an extraordinary train journey across the breadth of Tajikistan, over hills and mountains, through cities and villages, finally reaching the Afghan border.

Bakhtyar Khudojnazarov was born 1965 in Dushanbe, the capital of Tajikistan which at that time was a Soviet Republic. After working as an assistant director, he was accepted to the prestigious film school VGIK in Moscow, where he directed three short films before making his feature film debut, Bratan (1991).

In 1994 Khudojnazarov moved permanently to Berlin but continued to make films in Central Asia. Producer Karl Baumgartner (Pandora Filmproduktion) became his close collaborator.

His second film *Kosh ba Kosh* (international title *Odd and Even*) won the Silver Lion in Venice 1993 and his third, *Luna Papa*, was a box-office hit in cinemas around the world. Khudojnazarov created a stunning oeuvre of visually breathtaking films before his tragic death in 2015.

In 2017, Bakhtyar Khudojnazarov's friend and colleague, German filmmaker Veit Helmer started to search for the whereabouts of the early films. At his own expense, and after several years of research and work, Helmer completed the restoration of *Bratan* in 2022.

"My introduction to the cinema of Bakhtyar Khudojnazarov was *Luna Papa*, which came as a real aesthetic shock back then. I went on to discover his other films, and to watch the rise of this director from Tajikistan who would go on to capture the world cinema stage before illness cut short his unique trajectory. It is as a tribute to his extraordinary talent, but also to that of producer and friend Klaus Baumgartner, unequalled in his ability to discover this sort of gifted filmmaker, that we have decided with great pleasure to join forces with Veit Helmer to give a second life to Bakhtyar's oeuvre, to enable it to be rediscovered. *Brothers* is his opening act, and it is our hope that *Kosh ba kosh* and *Luna Papa*, his second and third features, which are currently being restored, will in due course take their place in this rediscovery." About the restoration

In 2017, Khudojnazarov's friend and colleague, German filmmaker Veit Helmer, started to investigate the whereabouts of the early films. Most had been made with co-producers from Europe and their

materials stored in laboratories in France and Germany.

But the whereabouts of the picture and sound negatives of Khudojnazarov's debut-"Bratan" proved to

be a mystery. There were several 35mm prints, subtitled in various languages, but the distribution companies who owned the rights no longer existed, and all distribution rights had expired. The original

negative could not be found in the film archive in Tajikistan, nor in the state film archive in Moscow.

The former sales agent of the film, Christa Saredi, gave Veit Helmer a clue. Bratan had been produced

by Tajik Film Studio in Dushanbe, on behalf of Soviet Television, as part of EKRAN, a program to support filmmakers in the Soviet republics of Central Asia. But by the time the film was completed, the Soviet

Union had collapsed.

Veit Helmer managed to locate the negative at the State television archive in Moscow.

The archive scanned the negative on a resolution of 2.150 x 1582 pixels, 10 bit and delivered DPX-files

via upload to Cinegrell in Berlin, who made the restoration.

The most complicated part of the restoration was to determine the color tint.

Colorist Mario Hartz made five more versions over the course of a year, with different intensities of

sepia. These were shown to Bakhtyar Khudojnazarov's close collaborators and relatives, before settling

on a very subtle sepia tint.

The restoration was completed in July 2022.
